Rector's Report

Dear People of Grace,

Let me begin with a heart-felt "thank you" for being the incredible spiritual community you are. For six years now, I have been consistently amazed at what you show me is possible. You have helped make me a better priest—and a better human being. Thank you.

This year, I wanted to highlight a few key things for you, looking back on experiences in 2019 as well as hopes for 2020. While not exhaustive in any sense, I think of these items on my "dashboard" as indicative of our common life.

- We have a phenomenal church and school staff, and I am deeply grateful for their dedication! Our total staff with church and school numbers 35 people—truly an amazing group of folks who give so much.
- We have experienced such growth and enthusiasm over the past six years—and this growth rests on the dedication of this community over its combined 192-year life.
- We have seen a nearly 50% increase in pledges over the past six years. Friends, I cannot tell you how extraordinary this is!
- We developed a new, integrated website and digital platform for communication and financial contributions.
- We ended the 2019 fiscal year with a balance of \$91,000 that we have used to further strengthen our building reserves as well as establish a development/spiritual imagination fund that we will use to explore a possible expansion in our worship life and community development.
- I am asking the vestry to focus in particular on the Participation Cluster for 2020, as we work to further develop a comprehensive framework for membership, community, and involvement throughout all demographic levels of the parish.
- We are embarking on a robust and reasonable Bicentennial Campaign that will position us for sustainable growth for the next few decades. Our shared work with this campaign will ensure that the spiritual community of Grace Episcopal Church remains healthy and flexible to participate in God's mission in this community.
- We will continue to focus on developing our Christian Education opportunities, with children, youth, and adults, and I have no doubt that we will see continued growth and depth.
- We are working to develop a new online, integrated membership platform that will enable every household to access and update the parish directory at any time. This way, it will always be "up to date."
- We will continue to focus on our worship and liturgical life. I believe prayer is at the heart of all that we do, and I have loved seeing our choristers grow and be so involved! As well, we are doing an extraordinary job offering spaces for music, art, and reflection for the wider community.
- We will continue our dedicated community ministry partnerships, exploring a partnership with "The Hub", a vital service at Gainesville High School for students and families throughout Gainesville and Hall County. We also look forward to the expansion of Family Promise services in their new location.

Key HIGHLIGHTS for 2019:

- CHILDREN: Substantial increases in Sunday morning formation activities and children's chapel; continued expansion of curriculum materials and resources; continued expansion of teaching teams; Who's my Neighbor VBS; Trunk or Treat; Christmas Pageant; service projects benefitting the local homeless population, the Food Pantry of Northeast Georgia and the Northeast Georgia Humane Society
- YOUTH: Pilgrimage News: Twelve youth and seven youth leaders enjoyed the experience of a lifetime in June when they completed their Pilgrimage Year with a trip to Iona and Scotland. The total costs of the trip were greatly offset by fundraising activities by the Youth throughout the year. In addition to the customary Cakes 'n Casseroles sales and a Pig Roast, we added two new fundraisers: a Yard Sale (graciously coordinated by Scarlet Pendarvis) and the option for parishioners to purchase "shares" in the Pilgrimage. "Shareholders"

were treated to a special program in September featuring videos and personal interviews with the pilgrims. Curriculum: Our focus was building skills of Competency (Scripture Study) and Resilience (prayer and spiritual exercises). In September we piped and drummed in new rising sixth graders, other youth new to the program, and graduating seniors (many thanks to Evan Kohler-Camp and Evelyn Forrester).

 ADULTS: Increased participation in all facets; School of Christian Formation; added a new Sunday morning opportunity for parents, "Parenting with Grace"; increased teaching teams; book launch for Contemplation and Community; Women's Retreat on The Enneagram; Advent and Lenten Quiet Days; partnered with Brenau to offer class on interfaith dialogue; Education for Ministry; Daughters of the King; Centering Prayer; began a new Artist's Way cohort; grief recovery group







Finance Report

As you can see from the attached 2019 financial statement, Grace reported total revenues of \$1,223,727 which was \$53,000 greater than our 2019 budget. Total operating expenses of \$1,132,187 were \$38,000 under budget resulting in a surplus for the year of \$91,540. The vestry has approved allocation of \$10,000 of the surplus for 'start up' expenses related to an additional Sunday service in 2020 with the remaining \$81,000 being added to our building reserve fund.

In addition to these excellent results in 2019 it is also exciting to report that our 2020 Stewardship Campaign brought in total pledges of \$1,081,847, which is an increase of 5.3% over 2019 pledges. It is also noteworthy that follow-up calls made by many members of the vestry were particularly effective in achieving these results. As you can see in the attached 2020 budget these pledges will allow Grace to continue to support and grow all of our many ministries.

Key Highlights of the 2020 Budget:

- Director of Christian Formation funded as a full time position
- Outreach Funding increased by \$10,000 to \$85,000
- \$10,000 in 'seed funds' for an additional Sunday service

The Finance Committee would like to thank every parishioner of Grace Church for making these impressive results possible. I would also like to personally thank Reba Page and all of the committee members for their hard work and diligence to our purpose. The committee will be in the capable hands of Hank Goble throughout 2020 as he takes over as Chairman following our meeting tonight.
